It was in the college days of 1979 when I first encountered orchids during a routine doctor's visit. While there, I noticed a large Cattleya orchid on his desk. I asked the fateful question: "What kind of flower is that?" To which the physician laughingly replied, "You do NOT want to know!" A short story by the doctor about his all-consuming hobby ensued and within two days I had gotten two orchids of my own.

During those college years in Northfield, Minnesota, I was put in charge of the St. Olaf greenhouse and its repository of orchids. I knew little about the plants but read everything I could get my hands on. After graduating, I moved to St. Croix in the U.S. Virgin Islands where I happened upon a sidewalk sale by the local orchid society. I joined the group, learned much about growing in a tropical arid environment, the native orchid species, and won my first AOS award for Encyclia bifida 'Loves Favor' AM/AOS.

Leaving the island three years later, I found myself trying to take 10 boxes of plants through customs back to Minnesota. Little did I know that the customs encounter would be the easiest part. It was a totally new experience trying to grow plants in a cold Midwestern state. Many plants did not survive. Many did, and I learned that orchids actually could be grown quite successfully in the stifling environment of a house surrounded by ice and snow.

During those return years in Minnesota, I worked in the horticulture industry, served in various capacities with orchid organizations and lectured to many garden clubs. I also had the privilege of traveling extensively around the United States, Europe and Hawaii for my career, visiting all of the major orchid nurseries. It was during this time that I started to turn my avid hobby into a small business.

Since 2001, when he moved to Florida, Jim has owned and operated Florida SunCoast Orchids which is located near Myakka City, FL. He has a 10,000 square foot greenhouse on five acres of land where he grows Cattleya, Phalaenopsis, Dendrobium, Vanda and Encyclia orchids. The greenhouse is only open by appointment but you can find Jim and his plants at 15-18 orchid shows a year around the state and at local markets in Sarasota. He specializes in growing Cattleya

and Encyclia hybrids, flowering in 4-inch and 6-inch flowering pots and baskets. Larger and smaller sizes are available.

Jim is also a hybridizer and has created such beauties as *Suncoast Sundrops* and *Florida Stars*. "I strive to grow and sell the best quality orchid plants for all our customers, and to build a lasting reputation in the industry as one of the very best."

Jim lives in the Sarasota area and has lived in Florida since 2001

July Judging

We are approaching the heart of hurricane season, so stay attuned to the weather. If you have a small number of orchids, you can move them inside your house for protection. You don't need to water once you move them inside. After the storm passes, move them out and then water and put out snail bait.

If you have many orchids outdoors in a greenhouse or hanging under trees, move them to the ground so they don't blow around and/or get wind damage. Put out snail bait, just in case. Once the storm passes, get them off the ground and rinse any dirt or debris that might be on the orchids or in the pots. If you use fungicides, it might be a good time to apply, and also try to dry them out a little by using fans or anything to facilitate good air movement. Remove any damaged leaves or other parts of the orchid to stop any source of rot or bacterial infection. We also have some more information in some of our earlier newsletters about dealing with storms. Keep your fingers crossed and hope for no hurricanes this season.

You'll notice some question marks after the orchid name on a few entries. These orchids have not been found in Orchidwiz. This could be because of spelling errors, wrong or incomplete name, or it might not have been registered in Orchidwiz. Please, save your tags when repotting your orchids.


East Everglades Orchid Society thanks David Schaffter, Erna Maxwell, Bill Carr, and Madelyn Tucker for judging our members' orchids.




